There ain't nothing wrong with models of Drake Tails! Lou brought a most interesting repurposed tool: a photo easel purchased at a church sale. He'll use it as a cutting guide for thin stuff: wood or plastic card. He also described the history of his current restoration project: a mid-19th century cargo ship. The builder of the model was a former sailor from the Graf Spee, who stayed in Argentina.

Bruce had some new tools, the most interesting being a knife-edge reamer; quite useful and very sharp (See the piture in the "Tips" section. He also passed around the new Warship Pictorial on the ALASKA. And, there was the most recent item from his 3-D printer, a corner clamp. (I wonder how many spools/pounds of plastic he has gone through.)

Tim Rulon had a wonderful half hull model, with sails, of the Blue Jay one design. Like Peter, Tim has his next project picked-out: Duma's Lightening kit.

Carl Erikson brought in a number of new (to him) old books. He also showed the progress made on his Fatherland 1:600 paper model. He is at the detailing stage, railing and fabricating ventilators out of styrene rod and small punched disks.

Joel Labow showed great progress on his Newark. That model becomes lovelier with each addition. Next up is plating and gun sponsons. He will use vinyl tape for the plate runs but not individual plates even though he has expanded plate drawings. He does, after all, want to finish it in his lifetime. Right now, everyone can go to www.ipmsrichmond.org, and pull up the 2016 "ODO" brochure for all the details on the categories, rules, vendor, and trophy sponsorships, it is all there for everyone to review.

A Visit to the Barcelona Maritime Museum, August 2015

For any model



shipwright traveling through Europe, one historic and important site to see is surely the Barcelona Maritime

Museum, located just near the water's edge in Barcelona, Spain. This past summer, my wife and I chance had to take Mediterranean Cruise for two weeks with the last port of call ending in Barcelona. We spent an extra 4 days there, and had a great time with lots to do and see. As always when I travel, I made it a point to visit one of the World's maritime foremost museums while I was there. The museum has several model displays of historic and modern ships, a full scale replica Galley, research and archive facilities, and a unique section specifically focused on the popular sport of surfing in Spain, with video. displays, and handcrafted surfboards to attract the vounger generation! Interestingly, an ancient Roman graveyard is unearthed in the middle of the museum.




What makes the museum special and of historical importance is that it is housed within the ancient Royal Shipvard facilities. commonly known as the "Drassanes", which are massively large fortress warehouse facilities made of stone where Galley ships were once constructed along with other facets of construction and outfitting since the 13th century. The shipyard was of strategic and economic importance to nearly 400 years of Spanish naval sea power.

Published sources indicate the Barcelona Royal Shipyard is a shipyard and former military building of Gothic architecture built during the 13th century under the rule of Peter III of Aragon. During excavations in 2012 it was discovered that in the late 16th century a new building was constructed on top of the old

medieval dockyard, giving the building its current structure. The excavations also uncovered a Roman graveyard which sits in the middle of the museum. The shipyard's restoration was finished in early 2013. The Museum was reopened in 2014. While we were there, some construction in the outer areas and other ancient wings called "naves" was still underway.

From the beginning the aim of the shipyard was to build the galleys for the Aragonese Armada. The shipyard was also a naval arsenal, which was used to store galleys



and all the rigging and apparatus needed. The arsenal also produced a great deal of material, both sales and cordages for the ships and arms for the men. Naval arsenals of the time, normally, had to produce and store food also.

THE LYNX

After the 1381 renovation, the building had eight naves, 8.4m high and 8.4m wide. The naves were, approximately, 60m long, consisting of 17 columns 77 cm



wide and 6 m high. During the rule of Alfonso V of Aragon, the

shipyard experienced its highest activity. In 1423, twelve galleys were built simultaneously. In 1571, the royal galley of John of Austria, commonly known as the



Real, was built at the shipyard. This galley was the flagship at the

Battle of Lepanto which took place on October 7, 1571 when a fleet of the Holy League, a coalition of European Catholic maritime states arranged Pope Pius by decisively defeated the fleet of the Ottoman Empire on the northern edge of the Gulf of Corinth, off western Greece. In the center of the museum, there is a full scale reproduction of this galley accompanied by a smaller, 1:24 scale model version in fine detail.

The trip and visit were well worth it and I would encourage all WSMS members to look it up online if unable to visit in person.

A Visit to the Musee National de la Marine, September 2015

i was lucky enough to travel to France by ship this past summer. While there I visited two French maritime museums. The first was

"The Cité de la Mer" in Cherbourg, the port at which my ship arrived. This Museum had lots of underwater scientific craft, and an "immersive" exhibit on the Titanic. It is located in an old train station that served also as Cherbourg's ocean liner dock.

I was also lucky enough to also visit the Musée National de la Marine (National Navy Museum) which is located in the Palais de



Chaillot, Trocadéro, in the 16th arrondissement of Paris.
According to google maps this building is about 200 meters (700

feet) long. It is located directly across the Seine River from the Eifel Tower. There is a LOT to see. I spent maybe three hours there. The Musée National also has annexes at Brest, Port-Louis, Rochefort (Musée National de la Marine de Rochefort), Toulon and Saint-Tropez.

Nearby, at the Jardin du Luxembourg (a city park), pond model



yachts can be rented.

The museum's permanent collection originated dates back to Louis XV! The first thing you see as you enter the Musée National is Napoleon's Canoe which is lovingly as well as beautifully



restored. No emperor should be without a canoe like this one!
Other major artifacts and displays included salvaged parts of the poop area from the galley "Reale". There are also numerous very large maritime paintings (10x15 feet or so) of various harbors and such. There is even a display showing how the French during Napoleon's middle eastern excursion engineered the transportation of a large, war booty obelisk from Egypt to Paris.

The museum has an incredible array of fantastic

models. The "Surcouf," a French submarine built in December 1927, and commissioned in May 1934 was my favorite. She was named after the very successful French privateer Robert Surcouf and was the largest submarine ever built until surpassed by the first Japanese I-400-class submarine in 1943.



This unique ship had a pair of 8 inch guns. I spent a fair bit of time sitting on the floor staring at this thing, as the cutaway feature made it feel real. I could imagine myself living here, cause you could see the bunks, galley, bathrooms (heads), etc. Also can be seen is a model repair workshop where somebody has a dream job!

As one continues to walk around you can encounter a model of the very odd Russian round monitor "Novgorod." I have no clue as to why it's in Paris!? Other displays included a French carrier, the Charles de Gaulle:





A row of WW2 battleships - the Richelieu, Jean Bart, Dunkerque, and a cruiser; a group of Ocean Liners, including the France. There was also an interesting ironclad and a paddlewheel-monitor. Unfortunately I forgot to record the names! If you ever get to Paris this a must see stop for any WSMS worth his salt!

with nautical theme!!


